Hello, Lake Cherokee Community, it's good to be back with you. This month's message will be a little different than the norm. Unfortunately, I must go over a few house cleaning items to start the month off. The CWC provides trash pickup service for our leaseholders at a very reasonable rate. We are fortunate to have this service, but it requires constant oversight to maintain its price and to keep other expenses from creeping in.

According to the CWC General Rules & Regulations, waste disposal sites are provided by CWC for household garbage only. We've started having a considerable problem with items other than household trash being placed into these dumpsters. The waste removal company can and has included additional charges when these violations occur. Another problem we face is when garbage is piled higher than the top of the waste container. The biggest violation of this particular issue is when cardboard boxes are not broken down and it only takes several large boxes to overflow these containers. This is another instance where additional charges are assessed. Waste collection is a budgeted item and every time one of these contractual violations occur, additional charges are applied. It is also imperative that the leaseholders who are having

any type of construction on their property, advise their contractor that in no way can any type of construction material be placed in the waste containers. When unauthorized items are placed in the containers, or when the container is overloaded, we must pull our maintenance staff off their jobs and bring a large piece of equipment to remove or compress the items. For most of the year there are plenty of containers located around the lake to contain our garbage. What we continue to see is one or two containers are overflowing and there is almost always one or two that are relatively empty. I ask that if you come to a container that is full, you move to one with vacancy.

We appreciate our lake family and thank you in advance for your support in all we do.

President Gary Mapes called the meeting to order at 6:00 pm Dee Rea, Secretary, pronounced a quorum.

Dee Rea made a motion to approve the minutes of Board of Directors Cherokee Water Company, November 14, 2024. Second by David McDaniel. The resolution passed by unanimous consent.

General Manager's Report:

Kevin provided an operation report including stats on administrative, patrol and maintenance departments. Other items reported on:

- 1. Kevin gave an update on the striping of the roads. Striping will begin the week of January 27, 2025. Office will put out a communication asking shareholders to avoid and minimize traffic over the paint.
- 2. Railroad Commission Update was presented. All wells of concern presented to the Railroad Commission by the Cherokee Water Company were inspected and found to be in compliance.

3. Construction of the Wedding Deck at the office will begin next week.

Treasurers Report:

A motion was made by Randy Graves to certify the bills paid for the months ending October 2024, November 2024 and December 2024. Dee Rea seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

A motion was made by Randy Graves to approve reporting of Financials for October 2024, November 2024 and December 2024. George Steele seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

David McDaniel presented variances to the Board for consideration:

Two Variance Requests were considered.

NG 46, variance requesting to build a new boat house, 86 feet from the shore-line. The committee voted unanimously to deny the variance. David McDaniel made a motion to the Board to deny the variance, 2nd by Randy Graves. The motion passed unamiously.

NJ 12, variance requested to build a new home closer than 75 feet from the lake and 50 feet from the road. The committee visited the site and voted unanimously to approve the variance. David McDaniel made a motion to approve the variance and Alan Koelemay 2nd. The motion passed unanimously.

Natural Resources Committee Report:

The committee met on 12/23/24 and 1/1325. The committee discussed several topics with majority of time focused on the report from Canvas Nature Resources. On January 13, 2025, Canvas Natural Resources met with the commit-

tee /board where it was decided that a formal Forestry Management Plan was needed before moving forward.

Therefore, I present a motion to the Board to engage in a contract with Canvas Natural Resource Solutions to provide the Water Company with a Forestry Management Plan. Upon approval funds will be allocated to the budget under Lake, Grounds -Engineering line item to increase by \$50,000.00. The increase will pay for the management plan (up to \$25,00.00) and will leave \$25,00.00 to begin implementation of the plan depending on recommendations. Second was made by David McDaniel. Motion passed unanimously.

A 100-year flood plain survey was provided by the Terri Winn Engineering firm. This will provide necessary information for the Committee to begin to prioritize areas for future silt removal. Improvements to Eagle Cove was also discussed. We wish to combine the 2 creeks emptying into Eagle Cove into 1 Creek as it enters Lake Cherokee. No other actions for the board at this time.

Community Relations Committee Report:

The Committee plans on a Shareholder Survey to be conducted in 2025 in the April timeframe. It is very important that each shareholder complete the survey.

Winter Adjustments - Make the Most of the Slow Season

Introduction

With the start of a new year and the recent cold weather spells, working out on the lake and around your boathouse is probably not high on your to-do list. But perhaps it should be. The winter is an excellent time to make changes before the spring that help with vegetation control and attracting fish. Structural changes like deeping out around the boathouse or in front of bulkheads via dredging or mechanical removal can help with vegetation control for the upcoming season. Adding fish structure and fish feeders over the winter is a great way to attract fish to your own personal boat house and enhance fishing. Implementing one or both of these strategies is a great way to get ahead before the warm weather returns.

Dredging

Dredging is the act of removing sediment buildup in a waterbody. Typically, dredging is performed on lakes in one of two ways: hydraulic dredging or mechanical dredging. Hydraulic dredging uses a pump connected to a hose to suck up sediment deposits and organic material and pump it into a dewatering bag that can later be picked up and hauled away. This form of dredging is far less destructive and invasive and would likely be the ideal tactic for cleaning out and deepening individual boathouses. Mechanical dredging often involves the use of heavy equipment which can be damaging to the surrounding area. Mechanical dredging can also be performed with amphibious machines depending on how large of an area needs to be dredged.. With this form of dredging the sediment and organic material is often piled up to be hauled away later or loaded into trucks and hauled away at the time of removal. The benefits of dredging include deepening the water to improve boat slip access and reduce sunlight penetration for aquatic vegetation growth. Dredging also removes organic nutrient buildup which rooted submerged plants use to grow. By removing organic material from the lake, overall nutrient loading is reduced as well as localized algae and rooted vegetation growth. Dredging can be difficult and cause a lot of damage to the land if performed by heavy machinery or by inexperienced operators. With the way Lake Cherokee is structured, we would not recommend mechanical dredging by heavy equipment for most people. Dredging with

amphibious machines instead of heavy equipment would be just effective and will avoid damaging yards and potentially causing erosion in the future (which would redeposit all of the sediment that was just removed).

Attracting Fish - Habitat Enhancement and Feeders

Habitat enhancement can include many different approaches. Recent efforts from the fishing club have been focused on adding Christmas tree piles throughout the lake to improve fishing opportunities for crappie and other species. However, adding habitat throughout the lake is not the only option and individual property owners can participate in the enhancement process as well. If you are looking to improve the fishing around your private boathouse you can increase the available habitat by adding artificial structures, christmas trees, rock piles, gravel beds, ect. to attract more fish to your area. This is especially true for individuals who live on the open water portion of the lake because these areas have less shallow water and natural habitat. By adding habitat to areas that previously had little or none, the amount of fish present in the area will increase. Which can improve fishing right off of your own boathouse!

The second way to attract fish to your boathouse is through the addition of fish feeders. Now, you should not necessarily be actively feeding fish right now due to cooler temperatures but it is a good time to start preparing for spring. Once water temperatures stabilize above 60°F you can begin feeding one or twice a day to draw in more fish to your area. Fish feeders are excellent for attracting bait fish and other species such as catfish. While species like crappie and bass do not typically consume fish food an increase in baitfish around your boathouse will draw them in as well. In addition to attraction, fish feed can increase the growth rate of the fish by providing frequent easy meals. It is important to note that not all fish food is the same and therefore the feed you choose should be based on the species you want to attract and grow. For example, if you prefer fishing for sunfish, you will want to feed a sportfish feed designed for sunfish rather than a catfish feed which is lower in protein and fat.

Lately, there have been discussions about the usage of the terms - Leaseholder vs Shareholder and which one is the more applicable or accurate term. And what are your rights and responsibilities as either a Leaseholder or Shareholder?

Actually, in my opinion both are accurate, and it depends on the context behind the conversation. If the discussion is related to the Share of Stock ownership - then the reference Shareholder is correct. If the discussion is related to your Annual Lease renewal or lease agreement, leaseholder (Lessee) is correct. In other words, they are interchangeable.

When you purchase your home at Lake Cherokee, there are (2) distinct activities that are required:

- 1. Closing with the title Company - Purchasing any Improvements / home on Lake Cherokee. This is the financial transaction side of the purchase.
- 2. Transfer with CWC/ Misty You sign your original lease agreement and your CWC Share of Stock. For purposes of calculating your interest, it is 1 share out of 1494 shares.

The CWC Bylaws state the Share of Stock must be held in the name of only one person. "Person" as used in this section means a natural person. (Article 2. Sec1) Therefore, if you have properties in a trust for estate planning purposes, it is important to have a conversation with your family regarding who will be named as shareholder for your Lake Cherokee Property. In the event of a death, you have a year and a day to transfer the lot.

(General Provisions B.1)

The CWC Rules and Regulations (General Provisions A.4) states that if a Shareholder becomes 30 days delinquent in payment of lease rental, fines or other penalties ... shall forfeit ownership of capital stock in the corporation and such delinquent shareholder's lease on the lot shall immediately terminate without further action. Simply stated, you need to be in good standing with CWC to retain your share of stock. As far as I know, CWC or the Board have never acted on this after 30 days. In the office, we send out reminders and other requests to shareholders to address issues in a timely manner. By holding a share of stock, you can attend the Annual Shareholders meet-

ing, in November of each year, either in person or by proxy. At the Annual Shareholders meeting, Shareholders of record can vote to elect directors and participate in any other business presented for discussion at Shareholders Meeting. In addition, as shareholders you are entitled to a copy of the corporation's financial statements. (Bylaws, Article 3 sec. 1)

The Board of Directors meet monthly on the 3rd Thursday of each month. These meetings are open for Shareholders / Leaseholders to attend to hear the business of the board. The Board has an open forum after the formal business meeting, if you have a question or topic you wish to discuss with the board. The minutes of these meetings are always published in the Chatter each month.

As a Leaseholder by signing the Lease Agreement, you have the responsibility to comply with the rules and regulations in force including any future amendments. You as the shareholder are also responsible for ensuring that any person holding privilege cards through you will comply with the rules and regulations.

As a Leaseholder you are responsible for the improvements on your property including any maintenance required on the property. Examples, include mowing your property, handling of debris from trees, keeping culverts clear to minimize drainage issues with your neighbors.

I am a shareholder, leaseholder and employee of Cherokee Water Corporation. I love living at Lake Cherokee and enjoying the company of my wonderful neighbors and friends. I hope you feel the same.



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CWC Spring Clean- Up Friday, April 11th – Sunday April 13st

During this period, both the North Side and South Side roll-off container sites will be open between the hours of 10:00 am and 5:00 pm Friday and Saturday and 1:00 pm to 5:00 pm Sunday. The sites will be manned by CWC employees. Residents may bring up to two (2) pickups full (approximately 6 yards) of non-hazardous household waste to the container sites for free disposal. If you need more than six (6) yards, please call the CWC office to make arrangements. All waste must originate from leased property at Lake Cherokee.

Rather than list what we will be accepting, let me list what we will not be able to accept. We will not be accepting any of the following:

· Hazardous materials of any kind

- Liquids of any kind (examples: paint, solvents, cooking oil, etc.)
- Items that contain PCB's (i.e., transformers)
- Yard waste such as trees, limbs, grass clippings, etc.
- Shingles and roofing materials
- Tires
- Mattresses
- Dishwashers
- · Construction Material
- Mini Refrigerators

Many of you wish we could accept yard waste and tree limbs, etc., unfortunately we cannot. To help with this problem, the CWC has arranged for shareholders to obtain, from the CWC office, landfill vouchers to dispose of these items at Pine

Hill Landfill. These vouchers are good for two (2) trips per year. Please call us for details of this program.

Through special arrangements, we will be able to accept some items that are not allowed at the landfill.

These include:

- Some appliances including those that contain Freon such as air conditioners.
- Vehicle batteries will only be received at the north side disposal site

To participate in the cleanup, you must bring the items for disposal and proof that you are a shareholder at Lake Cherokee to the disposal sites during the dates and times given above. Proof may be in the form of a Privilege Card showing you are a shareholder or shareholder's spouse. In addition, a valid DL or other photo ID is required. If the shareholder or shareholder's spouse will not be present (i.e., you have arranged for someone else to transport your material for disposal,) you will need to call the office and make arrangements. This cleanup is for household waste only from the shareholder's Lake Cherokee lot. No commercial disposal will be allowed.

Please take this opportunity to improve our environment, improve the quality of life for all of us on the lake and protect our community.

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
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NEWS FROM THE 19TH HOLE




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Facts about Love

CFC BASS TOURNAMENT RULES AND REGULATIONS

CHANGE FOR 2025: Cherokee Fishing Club's 501(c)7 IRS Tax-Exempt Status restricts the amount of money derived from non-members' use of Club services. The Fishing Tournament Registrant or One Team member must be a current paid member of the Cherokee Fishing Club. The Annual adult membership of \$20 (\$10 Youth) is used for member activities including running and sponsoring the fishing tournaments.

- A. Tournament length and bag limits for Bass Black, Spotted, Florida, or any combination thereof.
 - 1. Fish must be a minimum of fourteen (14)" or greater in length.
 - 2. Bag limit five (5) fish per boat.
 - 3. No dead fish allowed at the weigh-in. Dead fish will be assessed a weight penalty.

B. Tournament Rules

- 1. No more than two people per boat.
- 2. Winning places to be paid will be determined by the Tournament Director and in the absence of the Tournament Director, an officer of the CFC.
- 3. All weigh-in results of the Tournament Scale are official. Any protests must be brought to the attention of the Tournament Director at the time of weigh-in. The Tournament Director's decision will be final.
- 4. Prizes will be awarded based on team results on the heavy stringer. The Tournament Director may have individual prizes based on heaviest Bass, 2nd Heaviest Bass, and additional levels of Heaviest Bass.
- 5. No Fishing is allowed within 100 yards of the tournament weigh-in location
- 6. Fisherman must be in the Weigh-In line no later than the designated time of the end of the tournament.
- 7. The Cherokee Fishing Club does not provide tournament weigh-in bags and all fish must be placed in a tournament bag, with sufficient water to keep the fish alive during the weigh-in process.
- 8. Entry fees will not be refunded unless the tournament is canceled or postponed by the CFC President or CFC Tournament Director.

C. General Rules

- 1. All Texas rules of the Texas Water Safety Act will apply to all tournaments. The CWC Lake Patrol will enforce the CWC Rules, TP&W Rules and Regulations, and Texas Water Safety Act.
- 2. Each boater must wear a USCG-approved life vest any time the main motor is started or running. Inflatable life vests are permitted, provided they are worn at all times.
- 3. No alcohol or drugs are allowed while fishing in the tournament. Violations will result in disqualification.
- 4. Any person found to be cheating or endangering watercraft, its occupants, or the property of others will be disqualified and may be banned from all Cherokee Fishing Club events.
- 5. All participants must display good sportsmanship. Unsportsmanlike conduct, including cheating, harassment, or verbal/physical interference with tournament weigh-in or with other participants, will result in disqualification.
- 6. Participants may fish from the bank, a dock, a boat, canoes, kayaks, rubber rafts, and float tubes.

Generally, Fishermen may not retain any Bass brought to weigh in. All Bass brought to weigh-in will be released back into the lake unless the Tournament Director elects a Harvesting option.



- Teachers will receive the most Valentine's Day cards, followed by children, mothers, wives, sweethearts and pets.





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
















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
