Hello lake family, I hope you've had a great winter here on the lake, but if you're like me, I'll be glad to see it behind us. In several weeks, we'll welcome the opening day of Spring, and in several days, we'll be springing those clocks forward and getting ready for longer and warmer days ahead!

This will be a little longer of a message this month because I want to address one of the biggest issues we deal with here at the office. That is water drainage. I'm not talking about the drainage from all the creeks feeding the lake, but the excess water drainage from one property to another. I'm hoping this article will in some way resolve not only the need to get the CWC involved, but also to encourage neighborly communication concerning this matter and most importantly, to possibly help mend some of the fences some of you have mentally put up between you and your friend next door. Please read this with an open and understanding mind.

### Managing Surface Water Drainage and Property Owner Responsibilities

Excess rain and surface water drainage are common concerns for property owners, particularly in areas with frequent rainfall or poor drainage infrastructure. Proper water management is crucial to prevent flooding, erosion, and damage to

homes and roads. When water flows from one property to another, it can sometimes lead to disputes, especially if drainage patterns have been altered by landscaping, construction, or neglect. In general, property owners are responsible for managing the drainage that originates on their land. This means ensuring that water is directed in a way that does not cause harm to neighboring properties.

When it comes to lake lots, especially here at Lake Cherokee, the topographical nature of the land can create uneven terrain, with some areas being higher or lower than others. This unevenness can significantly impact water drainage, as water naturally flows downhill. However, determining the appropriate drainage flow can be complex, especially when one property experiences water runoff from a neighboring lot. In some cases, the higher lot may inadvertently direct water onto the lower lot, creating potential flooding or erosion issues. Due to the lack of obvious or consistent factors, or clear evidence of negligence or violation, the responsibility can sometimes be difficult to assign.

To prevent conflicts and potential legal issues, leaseholders are encouraged to work together to find practical solutions for drainage problems. Cooperation between neighbors can lead to costeffective, long-term fixes, such as installing French drains, grading land for better runoff, or maintaining existing drainage channels. Open communication and joint efforts help avoid costly disputes while preserving the integrity of the surrounding landscape. Ignoring drainage issues can lead to pooling water, foundation damage, and road deterioration, which affect the entire community. Before the CWC will become involved in drainage disputes, both parties should attempt to resolve the issue through direct communication and responsible mitigation measures.

Ditches and culverts play a crucial role in managing excess water by directing it away from roads, homes, and other structures. However, these drainage systems can become ineffective if they are clogged with yard waste, leaves, or other debris. Property owners should avoid discarding grass clippings, branches, or other refuse into ditches, as this can obstruct the flow of water and lead to backups or localized flooding. Blocked ditches can also create standing water, which may attract pests and contribute to unhealthy conditions.

Culverts, particularly those beneath driveways, must also be maintained to ensure proper water flow. It is the responsibility of property owners to keep culverts on their land clear of debris to prevent blockages. A clogged culvert can cause water to overflow onto roads, leading to erosion, pavement damage, and hazardous driving conditions. When water cannot flow properly due to obstructions, it not only affects individual properties but also puts public infrastructure at risk. Regular maintenance, such as removing leaves, sediment, and trash from culverts, helps prevent costly repairs and ensures that drainage systems function as intended.

I encourage each of you to do your part to work together on this or possibly any other issue that has potentially driven a wedge between neighbor friendships. Maybe your willing to begin communication again with your direct neighbor or someone across the lake, but you would like a neutral meeting place. I'm not promising I'm the world's best mediator, but I'll offer my office and myself if that's what's needed to resolve the issue and mend a friendship.

A meeting of the Board of Directors of Cherokee Water Company was held at 6:00 pm on Thursday, February 20, 2025, at NK 20 Lake Cherokee, Longview Texas 75603 with the following Directors present:

President Gary Mapes called the meeting to order at 6:00 pm Dee Rea, Secretary, pronounced a quorum.

Dee Rea made a motion to approve the minutes of Board of Directors Cherokee Water Company, Thursday, January 16. Second by David McDaniel. The resolution passed by unanimous consent.

#### General Manager's Report:

Kevin provided an operation report including stats on administrative, patrol and maintenance departments. Other items reported on:

1. Kevin gave an update on the lease renewal for Christus EMS.

2. Permanent closing of the drainpipe in the dam is close to completion. The actual sealing of the pipe will go out for bids next week. Also included in the bid will be the removal of the platform and valve located at the dam.

3. A new lease agreement for the golf course is being finalized.

### **Treasurers Report:**

A motion was made by Randy Graves to certify the bills paid for the month of January 2025. Dee Rea seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously. A motion was made by Randy Graves to approve reporting of Financials for January 2025. Dee Rea seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

David McDaniel presented variances to the Board for consideration: Two Variance Requests were considered.

NG 25: Committee voted to deny a variance for NG 25 requesting to build a new boat house extending out 108 feet. Tammy informed the committee via email the next day that the leaseholder had sent in a new variance requesting a new boathouse extending 88 feet into the lake (88 feet is where the leaseholder has 5 feet of water). The committee voted via email to approve the new variance requesting building a boathouse extending 88 feet into the lake. David McDaniel made a motion to the Board to approve the variance, 2nd by Alan Koelemay. Justin Simmons abstained from voting due to conflict as the builder. The motion passed unanimously.

NF 21: Committee voted to approve a variance at NF 21 requesting building a patio cover 4 feet 2 inches from the neighbor's property line. David McDaniel made a motion to approve the variance, Randy Graves 2nd the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

#### Natural Resources Committee Report: Dee Rea, Chairman Committee Members:

Justin Simmons Alan Koelemay David McDaniel Cody Edmonson Additional Attendees: Kevin Jones, General Manager Mark Svoboda, Head of Maintenance

The meeting began with a general discussion of the purpose of the Natural Resources Committee. In review we discussed the status of certain gas wells close to or on CWC Properties and brought their status to the attention of the Texas Railroad Commission. We were informed by The Railroad Commission that the wells are in compliance.

We also have contracted with Canvas Natural Resources to help manage the timber on CWC properties. The Committee and BOD have concluded there will not be a clear cutting of timber resources on CWC Properties in the fore seeable future. We must, however, thin and clean out underbrush in timber areas for good timber management and fire prevention.

We all agreed that the purpose of this meeting was to identify areas of profound siltation problems, to identify locations of all siltation ponds in existence and identify areas for the need of additional siltation ponds. It is the opinion of the committee that this BOD must provide assets, funding and training for Kevin and Mark to accomplish this job. Without doing this the long-term viability of Lake Cherokee could be in doubt. At the conclusion of this discussion all 5 members of the committee travelled around the lake to all known sedimentation ponds. We visited 10 known locations and 3 locations where

#### ponds are needed.

#### **OBSERVATIONS:**

1) 3 locations observed were not on the map provided to us. All locations visited are marked on a new map titled Sedimentation Ponds

2) None of the locations were in good condition or functioning properly.

3) Spoils that were captured in the past were excavated and placed beside existing ponds. This was observed at every location visited. This practice allows sediment to reenter the lake which in turn directly causes water volume loss.

4) Material used to construct the dams in many locations is of inadequate size and will not withstand the hydraulic pressure of the drainage which they purpose to sustain. This can be clearly observed as dams have been blown out in some locations.

5) No locations had any structures to slow water flow down before dam impact.

6) No locations had been constructed in a manner which would make maintenance easier without causing the destabilization of ground surrounding the ponds.

7) Sedimentation ponds should be designed and built to accomplish the purpose consistent with their intent.

8) IMMEDIATE ACTION should be taken to remove the spoiling material and stabilize the ground around the ponds.

9) An engineer will be consulted to help with the design and construction of future sedimentation ponds. We will be meeting with an engineer next week to help design future ponds.

10) A maintenance plan will be created and executed to maintain the sedimentation ponds once corrections are finalized.

The Committee finalized Shareholder Survey to be posted and sent out March 1, 2025. It is very important that each shareholder complete the survey. It is hoped that a response rate of 25% will be obtained.

Kristina asked the Board to mark their calendars for Wet and Wild Boat Rally to be held on June 14, 2025. The Board of Directors will host a boat house at the Water Company Office. Kristina promises the Dunking Booth will return with a surprise participant to sit in the Dunking Booth.

Another event mentioned for everyone to mark on their calendars is the Easter Egg Hunt scheduled April 19, 2025. Kristina asked the board for their presence at the various events.

With no other business, Gary Mapes adjourned the meeting at 6:30 pm.



How to Build a Wood Duck House A wood duck box should be mounted on a 10' 4x4 or 4" round post. This length post allows you to drive 2-3' into

the lake bottom. ou must use a baffle to prevent snakes from entering the box. Make sure the box isn't under a tree and it's 2' away from cattails. Cattails allow snakes to lurch over the baffle. Use 2-2x4 brackets on posts and place in opposite directions. It's not a good idea to place the duck house on the side of boathouses because snakes will climb the wood. Place 3-4" cedar shavings in the bottom of the box. Good Luck & call Vince Fowler if you have auestions! 903.738.7158

#### Aquatic Mammals - An Overview of Texas Species

#### Introduction

There are multiple species of semi-aquatic mammals found throughout Northeast Texas and much of the Southeastern United States. These mammals can be divided into two categories: carnivorous and herbivorous species. Carnivorous mammals include otters and minks, while herbivorous mammals include muskrats, beavers, and nutria rats.

#### **Carnivorous Mammals**

#### Minks

Minks are native to Texas but have declined in number and are relatively uncommon. They are relatively small in size with adults measuring 22 inches in length and weighing up to 3 pounds. Minks are excellent swimmers and prefer to live near surface water. They are opportunistic predators and will consume a diet consisting of small mammals, frogs, crawfish, and fish. Due to their low abundance and small size, minks rarely pose population issues to ponds and small lakes, however when frequent predation is common, can have a negative impact on fish populations.

#### Otters

Northern river otters are notorious for consuming large quantities of fish of various sizes. Otters are much larger than minks and can reach 4ft in total length and weigh up to 22 pounds. They are voracious predators and excellent swimmers, causing them to be problematic for fish populations in small ponds and lakes. Otters are more abundant than minks but are elusive and rarely seen actively swimming in ponds. Their presence in best identified by their "slides" which they use to travel in and out of the waterbody, and their scat, which typically accumulates in one area.

Management of otters and minks can be performed only when considered a nuisance that causes damage to personal property, livestock, etc. or by a licensed furbearer. Pelts and carcasses of otters may not be sold or possessed when killed for nuisance purposes. See

#### Herbivorous Mammals

Muskrats

Muskrats are small rodents weighing up to 2.25 pounds that feed primarily on the tender roots and shoots of aquatic vegetation. Muskrats, like minks, are native to Texas, but are uncommon. These rodents are known for digging small burrows into banks and levees of impoundments, which can cause structural failure.

#### Nutria Rats

Nutria are not native to Texas and the United States. These rodents originate in South America and were brought to the United States in 1938 as part of the fur trade. Nutria are similar too beavers in overall appearance but have a long slender rat-like tail, as opposed to the flat tail of a beaver. Nutria tend to be smaller in size and can reach up to 22 pounds. Like other herbivorous rodents, nutria primarily consume aquatic vegetation. This non native species is notorious for burrowing into pond levees and banks which can lead to structural failure. It is also hypothesized that nutria introduction and rapid abundance led to the decline in the muskrat population.

#### Reavers

Beavers are large semi-aquatic rodents capable of reaching nearly 60 pounds. These rodents, like must rats, feed primarily on tender roots and shoots of aquatic vegetation. Ofter referred too as "animal engineers" beavers construct huts and dams out of small limbs, mud, and other debris. Huts and especially dams can cause issues with water flow and lead to structural failure of levees and pond dams. Beavers do not tend to burrow into the ground as often as muskrats or nutria, however, their structures may be problematic.

Management of herbivorous semi-aquatic mammals has similar rules to carnivorous mammals. All of the above species are considered forbearers and can only be legally killed when deemed a nuisance or by a licensed furbearer (with the exception of nutria in some states). See the above website for more details.

#### Summarv

Aquatic mammals, namely otters, beavers, and nutria, are fairly common in Northeast Texas and can be problematic in some situations. The above information is only a short summary of each species and more information should be sought prior to taking management actions. In most natural settings and large impoundments, aquatic mammals are not detrimental to the ecosystem. However, when located near dams or small impoundments each species may present its own set of problems. Be sure to always follow state and local laws prior to taking or managing aquatic species.

### CWC Spring Clean- Up Friday, April 11th – Sunday April 13st

During this period, both the North Side and South Side roll-off container sites will be open between the hours of 10:00 am and 5:00 pm Friday and Saturday and 1:00 pm to 5:00 pm Sunday. The sites will be manned by CWC employees. Residents may bring up to two (2) pickups full (approximately 6 yards) of non-hazardous household waste to the container sites for free disposal. If you need more than six (6) yards, please call the CWC office to make arrangements. All waste must originate from leased property at Lake Cherokee.

Rather than list what we will be accepting, let me list what we will not be able to accept. We will not be accepting any of the following:

· Hazardous materials of any kind

Liquids of any kind (examples: paint, solvents, cooking oil, etc.)
Items that contain PCB's (i.e.,

transformers)

• Yard waste such as trees, limbs, grass clippings, etc.

- Shingles and roofing materials
- Tires
- Mattresses
- Dishwashers
- Construction Material
- Mini Refrigerators

Many of you wish we could accept yard waste and tree limbs, etc., unfortunately we cannot. To help with this problem, the CWC has arranged for shareholders to obtain, from the CWC office, landfill vouchers to dispose of these items at Pine Hill Landfill. These vouchers are good for two (2) trips per year. Please call us for details of this program.

Through special arrangements, we will be able to accept some items that are not allowed at the landfill.

#### These include:

Some appliances including those that contain Freon such as air conditioners.
Vehicle batteries will only be received at the north side disposal site

To participate in the cleanup, you must bring the items for disposal and proof that you are a shareholder at Lake Cherokee to the disposal sites during the dates and times given above. Proof may be in the form of a Privilege Card showing you are a shareholder or shareholder's spouse. In addition, a valid DL or other photo ID is required. If the shareholder or shareholder's spouse will not be present (i.e., you have arranged for someone else to transport your material for disposal,) you will need to call the office and make arrangements. This cleanup is for household waste only from the shareholder's Lake Cherokee lot. No commercial disposal will be allowed.



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

### CFC BASS TOURNAMENT RULES AND REGULATIONS

CHANGE FOR 2025: Cherokee Fishing Club's 501(c)7 IRS Tax-Exempt Status restricts the amount of money derived from non-members' use of Club services. The Fishing Tournament Registrant or One Team member must be a current paid member of the Cherokee Fishing Club. The Annual adult membership of \$20 (\$10 Youth) is used for member activities including running and sponsoring the fishing tournaments.

- A. Tournament length and bag limits for Bass Black, Spotted, Florida, or any combination thereof.
  - 1. Fish must be a minimum of fourteen (14)" or greater in length.
  - 2. Bag limit five (5) fish per boat.
  - 3. No dead fish allowed at the weigh-in. Dead fish will be assessed a weight penalty.
- B. Tournament Rules
  - 1. No more than two people per boat.
  - 2. Winning places to be paid will be determined by the Tournament Director and in the absence of the Tournament Director, an officer of the CFC.
  - 3. All weigh-in results of the Tournament Scale are official. Any protests must be brought to the attention of the Tournament Director at the time of weigh-in. The Tournament Director's decision will be final.
  - 4. Prizes will be awarded based on team results on the heavy stringer. The Tournament Director may have individual prizes based on heaviest Bass, 2nd Heaviest Bass, and additional levels of Heaviest Bass.
  - 5. No Fishing is allowed within 100 yards of the tournament weigh-in location
  - 6. Fisherman must be in the Weigh-In line no later than the designated time of the end of the tournament.
  - 7. The Cherokee Fishing Club does not provide tournament weigh-in bags and all fish must be placed in a tournament bag, with sufficient water to keep the fish alive during the weigh-in process.
  - 8. Entry fees will not be refunded unless the tournament is canceled or postponed by the CFC President or CFC Tournament Director.
- C. General Rules
  - 1. All Texas rules of the Texas Water Safety Act will apply to all tournaments. The CWC Lake Patrol will enforce the CWC Rules, TP&W Rules and Regulations, and Texas Water Safety Act.
  - 2. Each boater must wear a USCG-approved life vest any time the main motor is started or running. Inflatable life vests are permitted, provided they are worn at all times.
  - 3. No alcohol or drugs are allowed while fishing in the tournament. Violations will result in disqualification.
  - 4. Any person found to be cheating or endangering watercraft, its occupants, or the property of others will be disqualified and may be banned from all Cherokee Fishing Club events.
  - 5. All participants must display good sportsmanship. Unsportsmanlike conduct, including cheating, harassment, or verbal/physical interference with tournament weigh-in or with other participants, will result in disqualification.
  - 6. Participants may fish from the bank, a dock, a boat, canoes, kayaks, rubber rafts, and float tubes.

Generally, Fishermen may not retain any Bass brought to weigh in. All Bass brought to weigh-in will be released back into the lake unless the Tournament Director elects a Harvesting option.

President Genia Holland will contact local suppliers to obtain door prizes for the Spring Memorial Bass Tournament. She also noted the recent passing of long-time CFC member and ardent supporter, Lou Caffey.

Subcommittee Lead Lori Klump provided an update on restarting the Kids Fishing Tournament in collaboration with Coolidge & Company Real Estate. Several CFC support roles were discussed and volunteers were assigned.



Bryce Tawney, Secretary/Treasurer, provided a financial update for January. Bryce noted CFC's 2024 Tax Return has been filed. He is using the Cherokee portal for CFC forms and documents and encourages members to join the CFC Group within the portal. George Steele, Habitat Director, reported the habitat team had two work

days since our last members meeting. Another source of Christmas has been identified and a future work day was discussed. The brush team's efforts are to replenish existing brush piles.

David Wilson, Tournament Director, noted the Spring Memorial Bass Tournament will be held on Saturday, March 22. Tournament rules and entry forms are available in the February and March Chatters and the CFC Group within the CWC Portal.

The evening's program featured Dana Deason and Ryan Hill. Dana discussed his passion for competitive bass fishing and the good fortune of having some great fishing mentors, which he now enjoys paying forward. CFC looks forward to seeing everyone on Monday, March 10, including any shareholders who want to join or visit!!




